PUBLIC PARTICIPATION:

Gerry White (512 Orchard Ave) - Asked what the difference was between a Work Session and Regular Meeting. The Borough Attorney, John Schettino, answered that the Work Session was for discussion and not for any formal action to be taken. At a Regular Meeting, depending on what happened at the Work Session, the Council would be voting and taking formal action. She requested information about the notices that were sent to the residents regarding lead pipes going to the houses. The Borough Administrator answered that the Borough had received the same notice and did not have type of timeline

or data from SUEZ. Ms. White stated she read in the Record newspaper that there was another lawsuit filed. She said there seemed to be a pattern of problems, and she wanted to know if the three Police Consultants had any suggestions. Mr. Schettino stated that it was not advisable to talk about the ongoing litigation. Mr. Lorenzo confirmed that the three Police Consultants were still on the payroll. Lastly, she asked whether or not the "Your Speed Is" sign was fixed. Mr. Schettino stated that Ms. White could call the Police Department at any time to request information about the sign.

Youbong Won-Yoon (268 Highland Ave) – Asked about Resolution #2022-82. She asked about the services included in the General Code proposal. She asked the Mayor and Council to hold the Work Session on different day, change the meeting time, and hold the public participation in a question and answer format. She lastly asked about the privacy issue with IPS Group.

Neris Papoters – Asked when the pool season would start. She asked if the daily pass would only be paid in cash again.

Mr. Lorenzo answered Ms. Won-Yoon's questions. Regarding the General Code Resolution, the price included a one-time review of all of the Ordinances that no longer applied to the Borough. Mr. Schettino stated that it was recommended that all municipalities conduct a review periodically. Any change regarding the meeting times and dates would be up to the Governing Body. Mr. Schettino stated that there were many different Boards that utilized the same meeting room. If the Mayor and Council were to start changing their meeting dates, this would affect all of the other boards and their meeting dates.

Officer Robert DeVito answered the IPS privacy question. He stated that one can go on the IPS website and fill out a form to request that information not be shared with third parties when using the parking meter application.

With regard to the pool, Mr. Lorenzo answered that he did not know why credit card payments were not accepted.

Councilwoman Jang stated that on Resolution #2022-83, the dates of work completion were incorrect. The Deputy Borough Administrator responded that this would be revised to reflect the correct dates. She also asked questions regarding Ordinance #2022-2. Mr. Schettino stated that all State guidelines would still have to be followed despite not it being written in an Ordinance. The Claims Ordinance was to make amendments to the payment process for vendors.

WHEREAS, Hajas Associates, LLC is the taxpayer of certain real properties designated as Block 624, Lot 5; commonly known as 110 E. Columbia Avenue.; and

WHEREAS, the taxpayer filed appeals to its 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, and 2021 real property tax assessments, which matters are presently pending in the Tax Court of New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, the assessments for the subject property for the years under appeal were \$1,400,000 for the years 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, and 2019; \$1,947,000 for 2020, and \$1,976,800 for 2021 and

WHEREAS, upon review of information submitted, a reduction appears appropriate; and

WHEREAS, it is the recommendation of the Tax Attorney and Tax Assessor that this matter should be settled; and

WHEREAS, said settlement is in the best interests of the Borough of Palisades Park;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Palisades Park, that Tax Counsel be and he is hereby authorized and directed to execute any and all documents, which may be necessary in order to effectuate a settlement of litigation entitled "Hajas Associates v. Borough of Palisades Park", bearing Docket Nos. 004112-2014; 007303-2015; 006282-2016; 003708-2017; 004349-2018; 006232-2019; 009415-2020; and 007344-2021 presently pending in the Tax Court of New Jersey, so that the assessment be retained at \$1,400,000 for 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, and 2018; reduced to \$1,300,000 for 2018 and 2019,

reduced to \$1,872,000 for 2020, and reduced to \$1,901,800 for 2021; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the foregoing settlement is predicated upon a full waiver by the taxpayer of any interest payable to the taxpayer on the refund provided the refund is paid within 60 days from the date of entry of the Judgment.

RESOLUTION 2022-81: Authorization of Palisades Park Police Department to Participate in the Defense Logistics Agency, Law Enforcement Support Office, 1033 Program: RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE BOROUGH OF PALISADES PARK POLICE DEPARTMENT TO PARTICIPATE IN THE DEFENSE LOGISTICS AGENCY, LAW ENFORCEMENT SUPPORT OFFICE, 1033 PROGRAM TO ENABLE THE PALISADES PARK POLICE DEPARTMENT TO REQUEST AND AQUIRE EXCESS DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE EQUIPMENT

WHEREAS, the United States Congress authorized the Defense Logistics Agency (DLA) Law Enforcement Support Office (LESO) 1033 Program to make use of excess Department of Defense personal property by making that personal property available to municipal, county and State law enforcement agencies (LEAs); and

WHEREAS, DLA rules mandate that all equipment through the 1033 Program remain under control of the requesting LEA; and

WHEREAS, participation in the 1033 Program allows municipal and county LEAs to obtain property they might not otherwise be able to afford in order to enhance community preparedness, response, and resiliency; and

WHEREAS, although property is provided through the 1033 Program at no cost to the municipal and county LEAs, those entities are responsible for the costs associated with delivery, maintenance, fueling, and upkeep of the property, and for specialized training on the operation of any acquired property; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:5-30.2 requires that the Governing Body of the municipality of county approve, by a majority of the full membership, both enrollment in, and the acquisition of any property through, the 1033 Program.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, but the Borough Council of the Borough of Palisades Park that the Palisades Park Police Department is hereby authorized to enroll in the 1033 Program for no more than a one-year period, with authorization to participate terminating in December 31 of the current calendar year.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Palisades Park Police Department is a hereby authorized to acquire items of non-controlled property designation "DEMIL A" which may include office supplies, officer furniture, computers, electronic equipment, generators, field parks, non-military vehicles, clothing, traffic and transit signal systems, exercise equipment, farming and moving equipment, storage devices and containers tools, medical and first aid equipment and supplies, beds and sleeping mats, wet and cold weather equipment and supplies, respirators, binoculars and any other supplies or equipment of non-military nature identified by the LEA, if it shall become available in the period of time for which this resolution authorizes, based on the needs of the Palisades Park Police Department without restriction.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Palisades Park Police Department is hereby authorized to acquire the following "DEMIL B through Q" controlled 3-page property list win its entirety is hereby approved and hereto attached to this resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the "DEMIL B through Q" controlled 3-page property listing its entirety is hereby approved and hereto attached to this resolution.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Palisades Park Police Department shall develop and implement a full training plan and policy for the maintenance and use of the acquired property.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Palisades Park Police Department shall provide quarterly accounting of all property obtained through the 1033 Program which shall be available to the public upon request.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution shall take effect immediately and shall be valid to authorize requests to acquire "DEMIL A" property and "DEMIL B through Q" property that may be available through eh 1033 Program during the period of time which this resolution

authorizes; with Program participation and all property request authorization terminating on December 31st of the current calendar year.

RESOLUTION 2022-82: Authorization of Codification Services by General Code:

WHEREAS, the Borough Code of the Borough of Palisades Park originally codified in 1995 has not undergone any comprehensive review in twenty-seven (27) years; and

WHEREAS, the Borough is in receipt of a proposal from General Code in the amount of \$6,240.00 to perform an editorial and legal analysis in order to determine how the Borough Code can be revised and improved; and

WHEREAS, upon receipt of the editorial and legal analysis from the General Code, the Borough officials together with the Borough Attorney, will review and make the final decisions on any changes that are deemed necessary; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Administrator and Borough Attorney have reviewed the proposal attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference and recommend the approval of same.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Palisades Park, County of Bergen and State of New Jersey that the proposal from General Code in the amount of \$6,240.00 to prepare an editorial and legal analysis of the Borough Code in order to revise and improve same, be and is hereby approved; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:11-6 et seq., any contract may be negotiated or awarded for a contracting unit without public advertising for bids and bidding therefore, notwithstanding that the contract price will exceed the bid threshold, when an emergency affecting the public health, safety or welfare requires the immediate delivery of goods or the performance of services; and

WHEREAS, on February 8, 2022 the Director of Public Works was advised that a sanitary sewer which provides for sanitary sewer drainage on Railroad Ave were not functioning properly and needed immediately repair; and

WHEREAS, sanitary sewers are vital to the health, safety and wellbeing of all residents and the borough of Palisades Park and are essential for daily, and

WHEREAS, it was determined that the immediate repairs were necessary to restore the sanitary sewer, and

WHEREAS, the Chief Financial Officer has certified that there are sufficient funds available; and

WHEREAS, authorization has been given to Gotthold Paving LLC to commence with the necessary repairs to restore the vital functions of the Boroughs Sanitary and Storm sewers in amount not to exceed \$8,000.00,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that based upon the certification and representations of the Certified Purchasing Agent, the Mayor and Council do hereby authorize the payment to Gotthold Paving LLC, PO Box 2052, Edgewater New Jersey 07020, in the amount of \$7,800.00 for the purpose of the emergency repair of sanitary sewer on Railroad Ave; and

RESOLUTION 2022-90: Authorization of Revisions and Amendments to the Parking Permit System:

WHEREAS, the Borough of Palisades Park seeks to establish and implement a parking permit system for residents and non-residents; and

WHEREAS, after a review of the present parking permit system, the Governing Body desires to amend same as follows:

- (a) Two (2) free visitor passes per month shall be issued per household for use by visitors only while visitors are actually visiting the household to which the pass was issued; and
- (b) All vehicles are required to be registered and each household will receive up to two (2) free registrations; and
- (c) There will be no charge for up to two (2) Senior citizens, per household; and
- (d) Any vehicle parked more than four city blocks from the household for which the visitor passes have been issued shall not be visiting such household and shall be subject to violations and penalties; and

WHEREAS, the following rates were also proposed:

- (a) A monthly fee of \$60.00 per vehicle per month; and a daily fee of \$3.00 per day per vehicles up to three (3) days per month.
- (b) Registration fees shall be applied: (a) one year \$10.00; (b) two years \$15.00; and (c) three years \$20.00; and

WHEREAS, with regard to commercial vehicles, no commercial vehicles will be permitted to park on the street; and

WHEREAS, if a business owner or anyone other than a resident is applying for a permit, it will be necessary to have that vehicle registered with proof of identification to be verified and approved by the issuing authority.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Borough of Palisades Park, County of Bergen and State of New Jersey that the following revisions and amendments to the parking permit system be and are hereby approved:

- (a) Two (2) free visitor passes per month shall be issued per household for use by visitors only while visitors are actually visiting the household to which the pass was issued; and
- (b) All vehicles are required to be registered and each household will receive up to two (2) free registrations; and
- (c) There will be no charge for up to two (2) Senior citizens, per household; and
- (d) Any vehicle parked more than four city blocks from the household for which the visitor passes have been issued shall be subject to violations and penalties; and
- (e) There shall be a monthly fee of \$60.00 per vehicle per month with a daily fee of \$3.00 per day per vehicles up to three (3) days per month.
- (f) Registration fees shall be applied as follows: (a) one year \$10.00; (b) two years \$15.00; and
- (c) three years \$20.00; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Borough Administrator is hereby authorized and directed to take all steps necessary to effectuate the within referenced amendments to the parking permit system; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Borough Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to forward a certified copy of this resolution to the Police Department upon its passage.

ORDINANCE #2022-1

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 12 OF THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF PALISADES PARK ENTITLED "CLAIMS, PAYMENT OF".

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Palisades Park, County of Bergen and State of New Jersey, that those portions of the aforesaid set forth below are hereby amended as follows and that those portions of the Ordinance not set forth below shall remain unchanged:

Ch.12. Claims, Payment of

Sec. 12-1 Certification prior to payment.

The Borough of Palisades Park, by its governing body, shall not pay out any of its money;

B. Unless it carries a written order or electronic certification of a Department Head or duly designated employee of the local unit and the Chief Financial Officer having knowledge of the facts that the goods have been received by, or the services rendered, to the local unit.

C. As to services rendered by professionals, unless the Borough Administrator and the Chief Financial Officer having knowledge of the facts that the goods have been received by, or the services rendered, to the local unit.

D. As to invoices submitted by the Borough Administrator, unless the Borough Clerk and the Chief Financial Officer having knowledge of the fact that the goods have been received by, or the services rendered, to the local unit.

If any section, sentence or other part of this Ordinance is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance, but shall be confirmed in its effect to the section, sentence or other part of this Ordinance directly involved in the controversy which such judgment shall be rendered.

All Ordinances of the Borough of Palisades Park which are inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication as provided by law.

COUNCIL REPORTS:

Councilman Min - No report.

<u>Councilwoman Jang</u> – Said thank you for the work that was being done in front of the Board of Education office. She wanted to know if it was safe. The Borough Administrator stated that work was not done yet, and it needed to be determined what more material needed to be cleaned up.

<u>Councilwoman Pirrera</u> – Wanted to have a meeting with the Pool Committee.

<u>Councilman Kim</u> – Asked if the revitalization was being put on hold. Mr. Lorenzo answered that this would be dependent on the budget. He updated everyone regarding the first LED solar panel.

<u>Councilman Vietri</u> – Stated that the Fire Department was having fire drills. On February 2nd, the Police Department arrested three individuals for motor vehicle identity theft. On February 4th, the Police Department arrested an individual for a hit and run accident. On February 15th, the Police Department arrested an individual for aggravated manslaughter and child endangerment.

<u>Councilman Park</u> – Said that the DPW received 114 calls for service, 18 of which were sewer calls. The DPW used 225 tons of salt.

Councilwoman Pirrera brought up the possibility of installing charging stations for electric cars. Councilman Kim stated that it was a great idea.

Officer-in-Charge, Captain Shawn Lee, stated that the Police Department was investigating a string of residential burglaries in Palisades Park and surrounding areas. Detectives had been working diligently with the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office and had several leads. He urged the public to call the PD with reports of suspicious activity. He followed up with the resident's inquiry about the MVA statistics from last year. In 2021, there was a total of 948 motor vehicles crashes. He stated that if any residents had concerns or questions, they could request to speak to him directly or meet in-person by calling his office through the main line.

Mayor Chung announced that the Borough Hall would be open to the public starting tomorrow. Anyone entering the building would have to wear a mask. The March Mayor and Council meeting would be inperson.

Councilman Kim asked about the second COVID-testing facility. The Mayor stated that the second facility was not open yet.

Councilwoman Jang stated that the meeting time of 5:00 P.M. was difficult for her.

She read the IPS Group's privacy statement. She OPRA requested the final report of the Oversight Committee, and the response she received was that there was no report.

to clearing up the language in an Ordinance regarding payment of vouchers. There remains further discussions with respect to sick days, although contract languages have been changed going forward. The gas card issues had been totally revamped and resolved.

Mr. Lorenzo asked the Officer-in-Charge to address the issue of intoxicated people on the streets.

Regarding the emergency sewer repair that was done in front of Ms. Chung's house, Mr. Lorenzo stated that we did not receive reimbursement from the County for work that was done. A meeting was scheduled with the County to discuss this matter and other items.

Mr. Schettino stated that the current format of the meeting allows the public to participate more because many public entities only open up to the public once. He stated that the public did not have to wait until the Mayor and Council meeting to ask a question.
